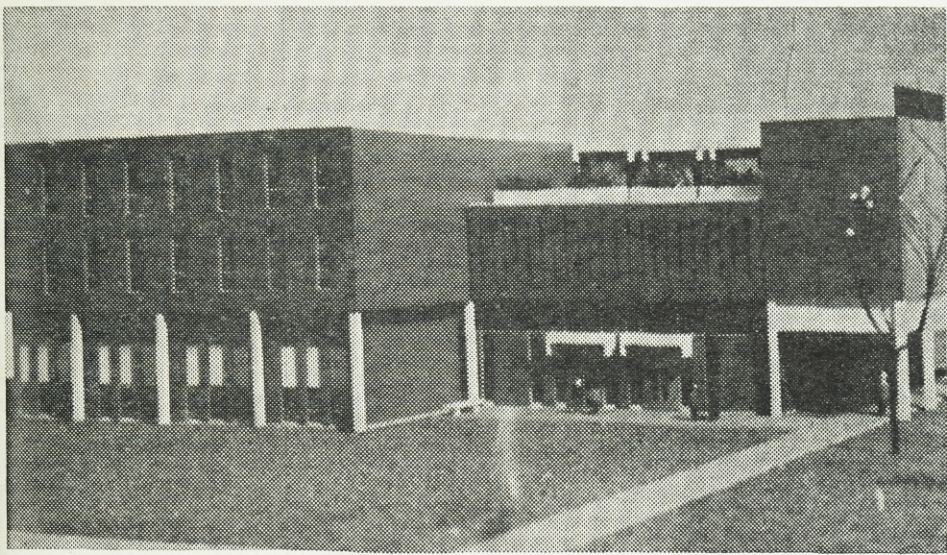

## Ten New Professors Added to Faculty

The additions to the faculty of St. Dunstan's University this year include ten fulltime professors, three part-time lecturers, and an assistant librarian. The additions were made necessary because of the rapidly increasing enrollment, as well as the introduction this year of the majors program in the arts course.

Mr. Kevin E. Boggins, who received his M.A. from the University of North Carolina, has been appointed Assistant Professor of Classical Studies.

Mr. Michael Foley is engaged as Instructor of English. He received his M.A. from the University of Ottawa, where he has done considerable work towards his Ph.D.

Mr. Donald Cregier, who is Assistant Professor of History, received his M.A. from the University of Michigan.

Sister Mary Peter, C.S.M., is Assistant Professor of Theology, and received her Ph.D. from St. Mary's University, Michigan.

Mr. Ivan Dowling has been appointed Assistant Professor of Mathematics, and received his M.A. from the University of Notre Dame.

Mr. Jacques Moisson, Assistant Professor of French, has an M.A. from the University of Paris, where he has completed much of his work towards a Ph.D.

Mr. Baird Judson is an instructor for the physics and en-

gineering departments, and received his Master of Science degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston.

Mr. John Edmund Coleman received his M.A. from the University of McMaster, in Guelph, and is an instructor in economics at St. Dunstan's.

It has been announced by the President of the University, Rev. George MacDonald, that other full time professors and instructors include Mr. R. C. Parent, a lecturer in biology, who received his M.A. from McGill University; Mrs. Ron Irving, lecturer on art; Mr. Robert Donnelly, lecturer in engineering; as well as Mrs. Grace Schillech, Assistant Librarian.

Returning to St. Dunstan's after further study in their respective field are Rev. Wendell MacIntyre, Assistant Professor of English, who completed his M.A. in English at McGill University; as well as Mr. Patrick McInnis, Assistant Professor of Philosophy, who received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Laval.

## Student Caucus to be Regular Event at SDU

The Student Caucus is S.D.U.'s answer to numbing, grumbling, frustrated, suppressed college beings. Held for the first time last night, it is designed to give all students an opportunity to express their views on current issues on the national and international levels.

The caucus will be limited to student participation, but faculty members are invited, indeed urged, to attend. Each session will have a student chairman who will keep strict order. Caucus members, when given the floor by the chairman, will be given five minutes to express themselves. It is expected that the chairman will alternate the speakers between pro and con as much as possible.

Notice of the topic for discussion will be posted four days prior to each week's meeting. Since speakers need not be prepared, impromptu speeches will be the 'order of the day.' The primary purpose of the Caucus is to encourage students to express their views in public. After the debate has finished, a vote will be taken by the members present. Student organizers of the caucus have expressed it this way: "If this vote is to stand in favour of your particular views, then these views will have to be presented convincingly. The amount of background reading or fact tabulation is up to the individual. The only requirement is that speaking etiquette must be enforced. The chairman has the last word on all procedural points."

The Student Caucus has been initiated by the S.D.U. debating Society and the Liberal and Conservative Clubs on campus, but will be entirely non-political in nature. All students are cordially invited to sit in, stand up, and speak out.

## NEWS BRIEFS

Attention ladies! The gentlemen of the St. Dunstan's Debating Society have finally decided that the constitution of the Atlantic Intercollegiate Debating League really does allow females to join their August "male" league.

The Liberal Party is holding a national meeting in Ottawa October 10, 11 and 12. Mary Cullen, president of the St. Dunstan's University Liberal Club, and vice-president Leo Broderick are attending along with 40 other Island delegates. More than 1700 are expected to participate in the meeting.

The Blood Donor Clinic, chaired this year by Senior student Paul Kelly, received 182 donors at the SDU clinic held in the Gym. This number was two donors above the quota. The Junior Class won the inter-class competition with a 64% turnout; the Seniors were runners-up with 54%; the Sophomores were third with 32%. The Freshman had 22%.

Federal Government officials will be on campus soon to interview Senior students for executive positions with the Government and foreign services.

On Monday, at 8:30 p.m., many St. Dunstan's students were entertained at the Confederation Centre by The Travelers, one of Canada's most renowned folk singing groups. Staff reporter Karen Kavana had this to say about their performance: "They literally 'love' to sing. They live every one of their songs. They could easily develop a following in the United States."

Two well-known seniors of last year, Veronica Swift and Larry Don Elyson, are spending the year in Northern British Columbia, where they have volunteered their services as teachers to a lay mission group, the Frontier Apostolate. They are working for \$25.00 a month. The SDU Mission Society has announced that one of the volunteers from the group will visit St. Dunstan's in November to explain the life of the volunteers.

The World University Service of Canada held its first meeting at St. Dunstan's last week. WUS states its aims as the expression and promotion of international university solidarity by the extension of material aid, through the sharing of knowledge and experience, and through the bringing together of students and staff. The local WUSC Committee announced that its principal projects this year would be the Treasure Van, the sale of international handicrafts, which will be chaired by Mary MacInnis; the Share Campaign, which will take place on October 21 and 22; and the Book Drive, which is scheduled for the near future.

Mr. Jim Carney has been appointed by the Students' Council as Social Committee Chairman for the academic year 1966-67. Mr. Carney, a Freshman arts student from New York, was selected by the council after his application for the position was considered. His duties include the sponsorship of dances on campus, hootenannies, and similar projects.
