A truly distinguished alumnus, the Bishop of Oklahoma City and Tulsa, Most Reverend Francis Clement Kelley, has celebrated recently the diamond jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. Few priests are favored by God with a half-century in his vineyard, and fewer still have accomplished so much for the Master as has Bishop Kelly. The reading of The Story of Extention and The Bishop Jots It Down will convince anyone of the really wonderful accomplishments effected through Bishop Kelley's zeal. Countless thousands of souls have been saved to the faith, or brought back to it, through the ministrations of religion made possible by Church Extension. Immeasurable impetus to Catholic writing, Catholic thought, and Catholic life has resulted from the untiring efforts of his facile pen.

It is a delight to us, in this College he calls his Alma Mater, that Bishop Kelley still thinks of us, still is interested in us, still loves us. A signal proof of that love he gave on his jubilee day when he announced the gift of his immense personal library to St. Dunstan's College. Still more—he gave \$20,000.00 to start the erection of a new library building. For all this we are deeply grateful, and beg to offer very sincerely our humble congratulations during this his jubilee year.

It was with regret that we learned during the summer months that Dr. Gavan Monaghan had definitely taken leave of the Diocese, and had chosen Oklahoma as the place of his priestly labors. Very many alumni will remember with gratitude his effective teaching and his zealous spiritual guidance. We wish for him many years of equally successful work in his new field of labor, and assure him our grateful remembrance through the years that lie ahead.

We extend hearty congratulations to Archbishop J. C. McGuigan of Toronto on the signal honor that has been conferred on him by His Holiness the Pope. Archbishop McGuigan, a former graduate of St. Dunstan's, has been appointed as assistant to the Pontifical Throne and a Roman Count. "This high honor comes as an official recognition of the fruitful successes achieved during his espicopate," said the Most Rev. Ildebrando Antoniutti, Apostolic Delegate to Canada and Newfoundland.

The Extension department of St. Dunstan's University is continuing its educational work among the fishermen and the farmers of the Province. This department is under the direction of Rev. M. E. Francis, a former member of St. Dunstan's teaching staff, who is well qualified for his new work. Three courses are scheduled for this fall at North Rustico, Morell, and O'Leary. Father Francis is in charge of the work along such lines as the Co-operative Movement, the Fishermen's Union and endeavors similar to those being carried on at St. Francis Xavier College at Antigonish, N. S.

The purpose of the department is to examine the present social and economic systems, and above all to

help the people to help themselves.

On Tuesday evening, November 2nd. Rev. Terence Campbell, former rector of St. Dunstan's and at present pastor at St. Andrew's, gave an interesting and instructive lecture to the college students and to the members of the faculty. In the development of his topic the Reverend lecturer gave a summary of the findings of paleontologists, geologists and ethnologists, and outlined Darwin's theory of evolution. The students look forward to another lecture from Father Campbell.

We regret to record the death which occurred on October 17th, of Frank J. MacDonald of the class of 1910. Mr. MacDonald was very widely known to the travelling public as the genial Purser of the Car Ferry. In former years the pages of *Red and White* were frequently enriched by the genius of his literary work, both in prose and poetry. His host of friends among the Alumni will regret his untimely death and will fervently say, "May he rest in peace."

Capt. Ralph McKinnon, a student during the years 1906-10, who had won his way to command some of the huge ocean liners of the American Merchant Marine, was lost last June when his ship was torpedoed in the Western Atlantic on its return journey from Europe.

IN MEMORIAM

By the death of Father Mathias J. Smith on July 21st. St. Dunstan's lost a true son and a highly respected alumnus.

Father Smith was born at Kelly's Cross. After having graduated from St. Dunstan's University, he spent three years at Grand Seminary, Montreal. After his ordination to the priesthood, Father Smith taught for two years at St. Dunstan's. From there he journeyed to Rome where he remained two years taking a post graduate course. Returning home he was for some time pastor at Iona, and later in 1919, he was moved to Kinkora where he worked faithfully in the cause of Christ until his death.

During his pastorate there he was instrumental in establishing a fine convent in Kinkora and in bringing in the Sisters of St. Martha as teachers; also of having grade eleven added to the school. He was a most practical business man in every sense of the word and among his many duties he administered the affairs of the Connolly estate which sponsors scholarships in the province. May his soul rest in peace.

On the second of October the soul of Reverend Patrick J. Hogan passed to its eternal reward. Father Hogan was born at Tignish eighty years ago. He was educated at the Tignish public school and at St. Dunstan's College, and after graduating from the latter institution, attended Grand Seminary, Montreal. He was ordained to the priesthood at Charlottetown in 1892, and was stationed in the city for a short time before being appointed parish priest at Tracadie. About thirty years ago failing health compelled Father Hogan to retire from active duties. He resided since that time in Charlottetown, and made friends among peoples of all classes, by whom he was held in the highest esteem.
