If there is anything wrong with college life it would seem that it is not caused by the lack of societies. We haven't heard of one for the prevention of studies, but there seems to be one for almost everything else. The latest to make its appearance is N. F. C. U. S. (National Federation of Canadian University Students). At a meeting of this society held at Mt. A., St. Dunstan's was represented by Leonard MacDonald and Wilfred Driscoll. A second meeting was held in Winnipeg during the Christmas holidays. This time Leonard MacDonald and Clifford Murphy looked after the interests of St. Dunstan's. N. F. C. U. S. has already effected reduced travelling fares for students, and is working for the establishment of scholarships for deserving students, both very worth-while accomplishments.

Early in January, several Catholic colleges in the Maritimes held a C. F. C. C. S. meeting in Halifax for the purpose of devising ways and means of helping the students of Eurpoean countries ravaged by war. Wilfred Driscoll and Mr. A. P. Campbell, M.A., represented St. Dunstan's. It was decided that each of the colleges represented should concentrate its efforts to aid some particular European College. St. Dunstan's adopted one in Cracow, Poland, and its branch of the C. F. C. C. S. has already raised the sum of two hundred and twenty five dollars to help that institution.

The co-eds recently put on a fudge sale in aid of the C. F. C. C. S. The results were very gratifying, forty five dollars being realized. It is reported that several faculty members colluded to impose fudge of an inferior quality on a fellow faculty member, but the whole sinister plot boomeranged.

On December 2nd, the Dramatic Society and Glee Club united in presenting an evening of entertainment in the College Hall. The programme comprised three one-act plays and several musical numbers. "Mike" Dunphy very capably acted as Master of Ceremonies, introducing to the audience several internationally known actors whose faces, however, bore remarkable resemblances to some of our own students. We understand that the Dramatic Society, under the direction of Mr. A. P. Campbell, M. A. and "Mike" Dunphy, will present a three act play later in the season.

In the latter part of December the Glee Club, directed by Justin Gavin, entertained the Sanatorium patients with a muscial and comedy programme. Many favourable comments were heard as to the high quality of the entertainment. It is noted that Justin is a very regular visitor to the Sanatorium, no doubt arranging for

future performances by the Glee Club.

St. Dunstan's debating teams of this year have been very successful, winning all three of the debates in which they participated. Jim Morris and Wilf Driscoll defeated U. N. B.; Cyril Sinnott and Lorne MacDonald won from Dalhousie; Allan Noonan and Evelyn Hessian were victors over St. Mary's. This fine record reflects very favourably on the coach, Rev. Fredrick Cass. St. Dunstan's now enters the Maritime finals against Acadia, and is represented by Cyril Sinnott and Wilfred Driscoll.

With regard to debating, the success achieved by St. Dunstan's teams has given her some very valuable publicity. To our way of thinking this is the kind of publicity a college needs, that is as an educational institution not as just another place where such and such a champion sport team hails from. This is not meant to minimize the importance of sports in college life, but it is a well known fact that there is a tendency at the present time to overemphasize sports and at the same time to delegate to the background the primary educational function of the institution. The fact that S. D. U. has developed winning debating teams as well as champion sport teams, gives us some evidence that she has not lost sight of the balance that should exist between mental and physical development.

OBITUARY

On February 1st, Bishop Francis C. Kelly of Oklahoma, a graduate and generous benefactor of St. Dunstan's, passed to his Eternal Reward. In another section of this issue further reference is made to his passing. May his soul rest in peace!

Rev. Charles P. Trainor, S. S. died suddenly from a heart attack, on December 23rd last, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he was visiting his brother. Father Trainor was a student here from 1914 ot 1918; he left after completing his junior year of philosophy to enter St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore. After ordination in 1923 he remained with the Sulpician Fathers, to make teaching his life work. He later spent two years in Rome where he obtained a doctorate in Theology. His teaching years were spent at various Sulpician Houses: St. Mary's Seminary, St. Charles College,

St. Joseph's College, California, and, for the past year, at St. Edward's Seminary, Washington. Father Trainor was a man of sterling character, high ideals, brilliant in his student and teaching work, and one who made valuable contribution to the education of priests in the United States. His death comes as a great shock to his many relatives and friends in this province. May he rest in peace!
